MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I am often asked, "Why are so many people seeking behavioral health services these days?" That is a difficult question to answer. But, more and more people are asking for and receiving services both locally and across the nation.

I think there are multiple contributing causes of this mental health service demand including the widely publicized opioid crisis, the continued decline of family values, the cyber bullying of our youth, and

perhaps, the gap between those living in poverty and wealth in America. I believe too that some mental health problems are not being treated early, and therefore, more people are coming in contact with law enforcement and the courts.

As the demand for services grows, it is clear that providers of services are having a hard time maintaining the level and quality of services needed. In 2015 and 2016 The Guidance Center experienced losses in funding and finished those years with a combined \$800,000 deficit. I am aware that many of my colleagues at the other 25 mental health centers in Kansas experienced similar deficits in funding.

Having lost this amount of money over two years, the Board and management of TGC adjusted expenses and finished 2017 with a margin of just over \$80,000. The staff reductions that occurred in the previous two years and the reduction in other overhead expenses allowed us to finish in the black. It helped that the State restored their 4% Medicaid rate and infused another \$200,000 into our grant budget for services to our most vulnerable patients. Furthermore, our county commissioners saw our need and provided small but important increases in their funding for mental health. Lastly, our community responded and we were able to raise \$50,000 through our annual fund drive.

While I want to celebrate our successes in 2017, I also want to draw attention to our ongoing needs. Due to our financial crises of the last few years we have not been able to provide salary adjustments for our staff and now we are losing highly qualified staff to the managed care companies, the Veterans Administration, and the public school systems. Many of our professional staff say they weren't looking for new positions, but when made aware of the financial incentives both in salary and benefits, their decisions were easy to make.

Our community mental health system in Kansas is the safety net for all our citizens who need services but cannot afford to pay for them. It is imperative that we keep this safety net system strong and that can only happen by continuing to provide funding that ensures availability and quality of service. Our Association of Community Mental Health Centers is hard at work this legislative season to tell our story to restore lost funding and to further enhance our system of care.

This year The Guidance Center celebrates 80 years of service to our communities. It has been my charge the past 28 years of my tenure at TGC to make certain that our citizens have what they need when they need it. We have been successful in our endeavors, but our future success depends on funding streams that make the investment in our citizens to ensure their mental health needs are met.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD



Adapting to continuing economic and political changes impacting the delivery of mental health services. The Guidance Center successfully provided essential integrated behavioral health care to the citizens of Atchison, Jefferson, and Leavenworth counties throughout 2017.

Taking advantage of organizational and budgetary changes adopted last year, the Center responded with agility to fiscal and operational challenges while providing 117,000 units of mental health services to over 4700 clients. Most importantly, we continued to operate under funding constraints without eliminating any needed services.

As part of the community mental health system in Kansas, the Center is an integral partner with the State in ensuring a quality safety net of services is in place. Last year over 32% of our clients were uninsured, and past reductions in Medicaid and State grant funding made it increasingly difficult to meet the needs of these members of our community who are neither privately insured nor eligible for Medicaid. Fortunately, our legislators appear to have a renewed interest in the needs of the mental health system and are considering options to meet funding shortfalls and improve the overall system of care. In 2017, we experienced increased County funding support and enjoyed our most successful annual fund drive in recent history.

The outpatient mental health and addiction treatment, psychiatry services, and community support services that the Center provides are essential to the immediate health and well-being of our clients and enhance the long-term quality of life of our communities. Adequate funding continues to be a serious challenge, but the Center does an excellent job identifying and addressing community mental health needs while serving as careful stewards of public funds.

On behalf of The Guidance Center's governing board, I wish to commend the leadership and staff of the Center for the dedication, professionalism, and compassion they demonstrate daily. The Center not only met the challenges of 2017 but is now positioned for continued success in 2018 - our 80th year of providing mental health services.







Revenue/Claims Paid





- tion to provide Autism Testing
- Our Psychology internship program became APA accredited.
- The Jefferson County office began providing Adult Case Management, substantially increasing direct service to SPMI clients.
- Clinicians participated in Crisis Intervention Training for Local Law Enforce-
- We collaborated with the Atchison Community Health Clinic to provide men-
- We were awarded long term extensions of our contracts with the Bureau of Prisons and US Probation Department.
- TGC Leadership Team staff updated our Strategic Plan through 2020.
- We began to Contract with HealthSource Integrated Solutions for Televideo Hospital Screening Services.
- We received increases in funding from Atchison and Leavenworth Counties. We restored \$200,000 in grant funding from the Kansas Department of Aging
- We restored 4% Medicaid rates cut by Governor Brownback through legisla-
